Carols on The Petwyn 2018

This has been an annual event in West Moors for many years - held on the first Friday in December, thanks to West Moors Youth & Community Club supported by 'Churches Together'.

Station Road was closed for the whole length of the centre of the village, including the car park in front of Penn Court which is where the main events took place. There was a traditional Carol Service led by Pastor Adam Parrett (Pinehurst Community Church) and Rev Ruth Wells (St. Mary The Virgin, the Parish Church of West Moors). The procession set out from St. Martins United Reformed Church at 6pm. Our loyal town crier Mr Iain Mitchell who has introduced this musical feast for nearly ten years, graced us with his poetry inbetween all the festivities.

Many people came to celebrate the arrival of Christmas by singing a selection of traditional carols and listening to readings from the bible by children from St. Marys First and Oakhurst First and Nursery School. A warm glow was undeniable with the trees on the Petwyn being adorned with sparkle and the Christmas Tree lights, once again provided by the parish council.

On offer throughout the night were festive flavours and refreshments (various food vendors, Mulled Wine), fairground rides, various stalls etc.

A visit from Santa kept the excitement going after the concert had ended and the Red Barrow Race (see next page) was enjoyed by all.



In between the activities there was a Christmas Tree Festival hosted by St. Martin's United Reformed Church. Anyone could visit the Church during the evening and admire the creatively decorated Christmas trees. After the carol service in the square the Gospel Choir sang inside the chapel at St. Martin's.

Red Barrow Race



Grant to EDCAB

On Wednesday 14th November 2018 Chairman of West Moors Parish Council Cllr Mike Hawkes presented the East Dorset Citizens Advice Bureau with a cheque for £300. EDCAB provide free, confidential and independent information about almost any problem.

Grant to RBL Poppy Appeal (Ferndown Branch)

On Monday 12th November the Poppy Appeal Organiser for RBL Ferndown Branch, Mr Roy Setchfield, received a cheque for £100 from Chairman Cllr Mike Hawkes.

The Poppy Appeal is the Royal British Legion's biggest fundraising campaign held every year in November, the period of Remembrance. Last year marked the centenary of the end of WW1. On Remembrance Day 2018 donations to the Appeal in the parish council office raised £36.43.

Apprentice Vocational Training Scheme 2018

In 2016 the Parish Council started the Apprentice Vocational Training Grant for young people aged between 16 and 20 and a resident of West Moors. Applications for the grant, up to £250, can be made at any time, although they will be considered only three times a year; January, July and September. The most recent grants have been made to Zoe Knight, 17 (Cinematography) and Rebecca Watts 18 (Hairdressing). This grant will help them purchase equipment essential to their course. We wish both young ladies success and take pleasure in helping them on their journey.

Jean Ware Legacy Award 2018

This grant is made once each year to a young person aged between 11 and 17 years and residing in West Moors with a proven level of ability in Sport, Design, Drama, Music, or The Arts.

The successful recipient of the 2018 Jean Ware Legacy Award was Daniel Neild who was presented with the trophy by the Chairman of the Parish Council on Thursday 20th December 2018.

Daniel is a footballer, who in 2017 played in the Gothia Cup, the largest youth tournament in the world with teams from 80 nations and 32 teams from England alone, taking part; Daniel was a member of the team reaching the semi-finals. He has also been a member of the county schools squad, representing Dorset in inter-county schools matches.

2018 has been another successful year for Daniel who passed all his GCSEs, gaining level 8 in PE. He has started a 2-year Scholarship with Yeovil Town Football Club which it is hoped will open many doors in the football world. It is a great step in Daniel's future and a huge commitment for himself and his parents, who have a lot of travelling to do.

This award can help Daniel with travelling and kit costs as well as books for his continuing education on a Sports Science course.

West Moors Parish Council PAVILION TO HIRE

The Pavilion consists of a meeting room which can be hired for various functions being equipped with a screen and projector and having maximum capacity of 60 people. There is a small kitchen with tea/coffee making facilities, toilets, including a disabled toilet. For sports events the building also has five changing rooms with male and female shower blocks. The cost for the Sports Pavilion Meeting room and Kitchen (Morning, Afternoon or Evening) is **£27.50** per session. It is available most evenings except Thursdays when the Council hold their meetings from 7pm.



Rubbish and Recycling

Most people in West Moors are recycling their waste. Please find below information about items that don't go in your kerbside recycling bin, and what you can do with them. If you can't reduce, reuse, or recycle your waste, please make sure you dispose of it correctly

Food waste	Only buy what you will eat Use up leftovers	Home composting Food waste bin	Never put food in any mixed recycling bin or glass box

Why not become a Parish Councillor?

What is a Parish council?

Parish Councils are elected councillors from the local community. They decide what services and projects the council will deliver and, as you will have seen through this newsletter, there are many different things that can be done.

There are currently 120,000 councillors in England serving on 10,000 parish and town councils. The Council is not a 'voluntary organisation' (although candidates do put themselves forward for election and are not forced into it!) nor is the Council a charity and particularly (a common mistake) it is nothing to do with the church. In West Moors your parish councillors do not get paid although they can recover expenses such as petrol costs for going to a meeting outside the village.

West Moors Parish Council is strictly audited every year to check that finances have been dealt with correctly and also that every decision was made within the authority granted to councils. Because of this audit system – or despite it? – Parish Councils are acknowledged to be the most non-bureaucratic and the cheapest kind of local authority in the country.

What can they do?

Parish Councils were created by Act of Parliament which does limit what they can do. However, the basic responsibilities of a Parish Council are "to improve the quality of life for residents" and "to give communities a democratic voice" which means in practice that your Parish Council can actively work towards bringing positive benefits to the community and also react to what the community tells it that it would like to see within the Parish. In the case of West Moors that has been improving the children's play areas, sports facilities, ensuring no charges were imposed for car parking, organising litter-picks, hosting Community events, providing allotments and many other benefits to the village. Parish Councils are not political (unlike the County Council) and each councillor makes their own decision on any vote. Parish Councils must by law meet at least four times a year – your Council meets once a month – and the meetings must be open to the public, although of course just occasionally a confidential matter will mean the public and press can be excluded.

Why Become a Parish Councillor?

Being a parish councillor is both a rewarding and privileged form of public service. You will be in a position to make a difference to the quality of people's daily lives and prospects. As a local councillor, your residents will expect you to respond to their queries and investigate their concerns; this can be truly rewarding and certainly educational!

West Moors Parish Council areas of responsibility include:

- Administration of Fryer Field recreation area which includes a sports pavilion, a multi-use games area (MUGA), football pitches, skatepark and children's play areas.
- Administration of West Moors Cemetery located in Priory Road.
- Administration of the Petwyn Village Green located in Station Road.
- Administration of Allotments located at Gulliver's Farm
- Provision of some street furniture including benches, bus shelters, entry signs into the village.
- Consultation on all planning applications within the village.
- Provision of small grants to local organisations which help the village.
- Liaison with Dorset County Council with regard to rights of way and footpaths.
- Management and operation of CCTV covering the Fryer Field and MUGA area.

The Parish Council has 3 committees dealing with various functions and activities: the Environment Committee, the Finance and General Purpose Committee and the Planning Consultative Committee.
